## **Know Your Rights!**

To make a complaint under the BC Human Rights Code, all of the following must be true:

- □ You have been treated badly or denied a benefit.
- □ There is a connection between the way you have been treated (badly or denied a benefit) and your sexual orientation or gender identity/expression.
- □ The treatment occurred in a situation such as in a health care encounter.

You must file your complaint within **6 months** after the event.
