	<p>Dr. Raziya Mia is Medical Education Lead for BC Cancer’s Family Practice Oncology Network. She is the physician lead for the Network’s education and CME programming including its GPO Education Program, Family Practice Oncology CME Day, GPO Case Study Day, and Oncology CME Webcasts. Dr. Mia worked as a GPO at BC Cancer – Abbotsford between September 2008 and March 2019. Previously, she maintained a long-time family practice in Kamloops where she also participated in the CME Committee at Royal Inland Hospital. She has also served as a board member with the BC College of Family Physicians and is a Clinical Instructor with the University of British Columbia Medical School’s Department of Family Practice. Dr. Mia was born in South Africa, moved to Canada during her formative years, and graduated from UBC Medical School. She enjoys spending as much time as possible with her growing family.</p>
<b>10:20 – 10:30</b>	<b>Greetings from BC Cancer – Dr. Kim Nguyen Chi</b>
	<p>Dr. Kim Nguyen Chi is a Medical Oncologist and the Chief Medical Officer of BC Cancer, which provides a comprehensive cancer control program for the people of British Columbia. He is also a Professor of Medicine at the University of British Columbia, and Chairs the Genitourinary Disease Site Committee for the Canadian Cancer Trials Group (CCTG) and the Co-Chair for the Canadian Uro-Onology Group (CUOG). Dr. Chi’s research is in the area of genitourinary cancers with a focus in prostate cancer and investigational new drugs. This includes outcomes, phase I-III clinical trials, neoadjuvant studies and mechanisms of treatment resistance. He has had peer-reviewed grant funding from the Canada Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), National Cancer Institute of Canada (NCIC)/Canadian Cancer Society (CCS), the US Department of Defense, Movember, Prostate Cancer Foundation (US) and Prostate Cancer Canada.</p>

	<p>Dr. Colin Mar is a Radiologist at BC Cancer – Vancouver, and a Clinical Assistant Professor in UBC Radiology. He serves as Medical Director, BC Cancer Breast Screening.</p>

	<p>Dr. Murette Lee is the Provincial Colposcopy Lead for the Cervix Screening Program at BC Cancer, and a Gynecologic Oncologist at Vancouver General Hospital and BC Cancer – Vancouver. She completed her Obstetrics and Gynecology residency at Queens University, and then came to Vancouver in 2009 to complete a fellowship in Gynecologic Oncology, where she has stayed on to practice. In 2015, she completed her MPH at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Her research activities relate mainly to lower genital tract and HPV, and she is involved in guideline and program development for cervical cancer screening and colposcopy in BC and nationally.</p>

	<p>Dr. Amanda Li is a Clinical Assistant Professor with the Department of Pediatric Hematology, Oncology, and Bone Marrow Transplant at UBC. Dr. Li completed her medical degree at Dalhousie University in 2010, and pediatrics residency and pediatric Hematology-Oncology fellowship at UBC. Following this, she undertook further fellowship training at Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia in Cancer Immunotherapy and Bone Marrow Transplant. She joined the staff at BC Children’s Hospital in Vancouver last fall, with the goal of expanding the pediatric CAR T-Cell and Cellular Therapy Program.</p>

### **Childhood Cancer Insights: Cannabis in Kids with Cancer – Dr. Rod Rassekh**



Dr. Rod Rassekh grew up in Vancouver, and then went east to McGill to study microbiology and immunology. He returned home for medical school and graduated from UBC in 2000. He completed his pediatric residency and continued on to complete his Pediatric Hematology/Oncology fellowship in 2007, both at BC Children's Hospital. He also obtained a Masters of Health Science from UBC in 2007. Since completing his training, he has been a Clinical Assistant Professor at BCCH, and a clinician-investigator in the Michael Cuccione Childhood Cancer Research Program. His research interests are in bringing genomics into the oncology clinics, with a special focus on pharmacogenetics of drug toxicity. He is also interested in tumour genomics and precision medicine, co-leading the pediatric arm of the Personalized OncoGenomics (POG). His clinical interests are in supportive care, including the use of medical cannabinoids by patients.

Dr. Sophie Sun is a Medical Oncologist and Co-Medical Director of BC Cancer's Hereditary Cancer Program. Dr. Sun studied medicine at the University of Toronto and completed her internal medicine residency in Calgary before moving to Vancouver in 2003 for medical oncology training at BC Cancer. Her research interests include cancer genetics, onco-genomics, and clinical trials with a focus on breast and lung cancer.

Dr. Intan Schrader is a Medical Geneticist specializing in cancer genetics and Co-Medical Director of BC Cancer's Hereditary Cancer Program. Dr. Schrader received her medical degree from the University of Melbourne and completed her residency in medical genetics at UBC. Her research interests include the molecular detection of known and novel cancer susceptibility, germline findings and tumour sequencing, familial pancreatic cancer, and hereditary diffuse gastric cancer.
