## PANCREATIC CANCER

Pancreatic cancer starts in the pancreas, a gland deep in the abdomen behind the stomach that helps with the digestion of food and the regulation of blood sugar levels in the body. If you are dealing with pancreatic cancer, or if you are a friend, family member, or caregiver of a pancreatic cancer patient, you may be looking for information to help you understand and cope with the disease, searching for reliable online resources, or wanting to connect with someone going through a similar journey. ## **SUPPORT PROGRAMS**

This section provides a list of relevant support programs offered by community organizations or BC Cancer. BC Cancer centres generally offer monthly support groups, sometimes specific to particular types of cancer. Also offered are facilitated groups to help with stress reduction, including mindfulness based stress reduction, relaxation and stress management, and therapeutic touch. Availability varies by location. For a schedule of support groups offered, contact the Patient and Family Counselling Department at the closest BC Cancer regional centre.

**BC Cancer Patient & Family Counselling**

This service is available to anyone in BC who has received a diagnosis of cancer, as well as those supporting them. Counselling is available to individuals, couples, and families, either in person or over the phone. The services are solution-focused and are limited to addressing challenges related to cancer.
