WHAT'S NEW

Nursing Practice References (NPR) Revision Process

BC Cancer NPRs undergo a major review and revision every five years, with many of the current NPRs due for revision in the next year. The BC Cancer Nursing Practice Committee has historically been responsible for reviewing and approving NPRs; however, with the sunsetting of the committee earlier this year, there has been a need to develop a new review and approval process. Members of the Nurse Educator group, in collaboration with the Policy Office, have created a new structure to ensure that a robust and appropriate review and approval process is completed in a timely manner.

NPR revisions and approval of revisions will be completed by an ad hoc working group, with membership comprising at least the following:

- 2 Clinical Nurse Leaders
- 2 Direct Care Nurses
- 2 Nurse Educators
- 1 Senior Practice Leader



Other content experts are required (i.e. Infection Prevention and Control Practitioner, Pharmacy, etc.)

All six BC Cancer centres must be represented, with final sign-off completed by the Director of Professional Practice Nursing. Questions about the new process? Follow up with your local Clinical Nurse Educator, or refer to the FAQ document.

Biosimilars

Biosimilars are biologic medicines (complex protein molecules created inside a living cell), that work the same as the original brand name biologic drug that we refer to as a reference biologic. Biologics have been a mainstay in many types of cancer treatment including breast, GI, lung and ovarian cancers. They are new to Systemic Therapy at BC Cancer but have been approved for use in Canada since 2009 for conditions such as arthritis and diabetes. We have used a biosimilar drug in one supportive care indication in BC Cancer in the form of Grastofil. Similar to generic drugs, Health Canada has very strict rules and high standards that companies manufacturing biosimilars need to meet. These drugs are highly similar, having the same: mechanism of action, side effect profile, and administration guidelines as their reference biologic *and* they must be proven to work just as well. In November of 2019, the first biosimilar, Zirabev, which is the biosimilar trade name for the reference biologic Bevacizumab, was implemented at BC Cancer. In early 2020, BC Cancer will integrate 2 more commonly used biologic biosimilars into practice - rituximab and trastuzumab. For more information, visit the BC Cancer website.

Smoking Cessation Update

Thank you to everyone for your dedication in promoting smoking cessation to our patients! As we know, smoking cessation following a cancer diagnosis is an important part of cancer treatment and helps to improve patient outcomes. As a recap, the primary goals of the program are to:

- Screen all new patients for smoking status
- Advise current smokers on the benefits of quitting specific to a cancer diagnosis
- Refer identified current smokers to QuitNow, our free provincial quit smoking program

New updates regarding smoking cessation include:

• Quit Path brochures for Yukon patients, which are now available at all centres

Provincial Nursing Orientation Update

Research Innovation and Education has been busy collaborating with Clinical Nurse Educators, Senior Practice Leads and Clinical Nurse Leaders around the province to make important updates to Nursing Orientation at BC Cancer. Our changes are based on what we heard from YOU in the Needs Assessment, which was conducted in the fall of 2018 and spring of 2019. We heard loud and clear that nurses:

- Often felt overwhelmed by the level of detail in orientation and wanted a more structured and laddered approach. In other words, you told us to give you the information that you need to feel ready to practice and do your job.
- Wanted more 'hands on' opportunities to practice what they learned in orientation, including skills workshops, case studies, and simulation based learning.

As highlighted in the last issue, work completed thus far includes updates to the management of hazardous drug spills, with the inclusion of a spill simulation, a new Serious Illness Conversations, Advance Care Planning, and Medical Assistance in Dying interactive group case study, featuring a patient speaker who courageously shares her experience with these complex topics, and a much needed update to Cancer Fundamentals and Supporting Patients with Cancer.

We currently have 4 working groups tackling the next orientation updates, including revamping Introduction to Patient Education, Introduction to Nursing Resources, Infusion Therapy, and the Symptom Management Guidelines workshop. Our plan is to roll out theses updated sessions early in 2020! Lastly, we have created and implemented a robust evaluation, so any future changes to orientation will be based on clear evidence and the learner's voice!

Educator Pathway

Level 2

The Educator Pathway Level 2 was a successful re-launch of PHSA's Educator Pathway. Over 2 months, educators across PHSA met 8 times for a full day of learning, collaboration and fun. Patient education issues and strategies associated with immunotherapy

This article, written by Lasa-Blandon et al, discusses not only the complexities involved in patient education, particularly in the oncology setting, but also the potential for serious adverse events associated with immunotherapy drugs. It is important for health care providers who administer immunotherapies (and assist patients in managing potential side effects) are provided with appropriate teaching strategies to empower patients and caregivers in identifying early toxicities.

"Patients require ongoing education to their clinical needs. It is a critical role of the nurse to provide individualized patient education that includes consideration of barriers and methods of learning."
