






Survivorship Care

- Institute of Medicine (IOM) USA
 - Essential components:
 - Prevention of recurrent and new cancers, & of other late effects
 - Surveillance for cancer spread, recurrence, or second cancers
 - Assessment of medical and psychosocial late effects
 - Intervention for consequences of cancer & its treatment
 - Coordination between specialists & primary care



From diagnosis until end of life





Survivorship Care

- Institute of Medicine (IOM) USA
 - Elements to include in a Survivorship Care Plan:
 - Cancer type, treatments received & their potential consequences
 - Specific information about the timing & content of recommended follow-up
 - Recommendations regarding preventive practices & how to maintain health & well-being
 - Information on legal protections regarding employmet
 - The availability of psychoscial services in the community

Breast Cancer Survivorship: South Asian Women's Understanding of the Follow-up care & their perspectives & preferences for information post-treatment

- 24 participants for qualitative inquiry
- Focused group & individual interviews
- Perceptions of contents similar to other Canadian studies
- Mindful of "Quiet acceptance"
- Conducting a psychological assessment of depression & distress important

Breast Cancer Survivorship Care tailored to South Asian Women

- 257 questionnairs sent to SA breast cancer survivors
- Compared with similar questionnairs sent to a predominantly Caucasian cohort
- Post-treatment effects & social emotional impacts similar cross ethnicity
- High compliance rate regarding adjuvant hormonal therapy and visiting family physicians as planned
- Cultural insights, such as the importance of family, influence survivorship care

Implementation & Evaluation of a Breast Cancer Survivorship Care program tailored to SA Women

- Survivorship Care Plan Template and resource package designed & translated
 - Diagnosis & treatment section in plain language
 - Resources
 - English and Punjabi language
 - Includes Letter From Your Oncologist summary of main message
- Nurses prepared the individualized SCP package
- Nurses delivered the SCP with interpreter assistance
- Information on sexuality & mental health presented in a culturally acceptable manner
- Copies of SCPs followed by questionnaires sent to family

Implementation & Evaluation of a Breast Cancer Survivorship Care program tailored to SA Women

- Knowledge gained about SCP implementation for breast cancer patients
- Data is being analyzed
- Resource intensive to deliver SCP for all discharged patients
- SCP has been implemented only at some cancer centres
- SCP is not implemented as standard care at BCCA

- To compare two approaches of SCP implementation
- Breast cancer patients at discharge when adjuvant therapies are completed at cancer centre
- SCP template based on one designed for SA study
- Conventional arm: nurse prepared tx summary
- Innovative arm: self prepared treatment summary



- 17 innovative, 16 conventional participants enrolled
- Only 9 innovative and 14 conventional participants discharged
- Only 5 innovative and 11 conventional participants completed the post SCP Continuity of Care questionnaires



• At discharge:

- Conventional participants (>50%) indicated a lack of understandings with the name of their cancer and available support resources
- Innovative participants (25%) had questions and wanted to talk to someone

• After discharge:

Both reported some degree of dissatisfaction with "knowledge of communication between cancer centre and family doctor"



- Nursing resource required
 - Average 41 minutes to prepare treatment summaries
 - Similar SCP appointment time (approx. 60 minutes)
- For innovative participants
 - Only 4/8 prepared own treatment summaries: 2
 completely and 2 partially

Information to support women completing treatment for newly diagnosed Ovarian Cancer

 Starting September 2013, every patient completing chemotherapy is provided with survivorship information package (YANA) and "Letter from Your Oncologist"



• Patient Continuity of Care Questionnaire sent to 104 patients before implementation (historical cohort) and after implementation (new information cohort)



Summary

- Plenty of guidelines of what needs to be done
- Lack of resources to implement what is ideal
- Research and feedback from survivors needed regarding the most efficient ways of implementation of SCP
