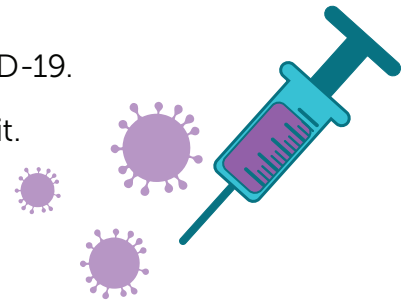


COVID-19 Vaccine:

What people with cancer need to know

Should I get the COVID-19 vaccine?

- People with cancer may be at a higher risk of getting sick from COVID-19.
- When you are offered a COVID-19 vaccine, we recommend you get it.
- While you are waiting for a vaccine, and after you get the vaccine, you should continue to follow all Public Health safety guidelines.



Can I get the vaccine if I am having treatment for cancer?

- Experts believe the COVID-19 vaccines being used in B.C. are safe for people with cancer, people having cancer treatment or people recovering from cancer.
- When you are having cancer treatment, your body may not be able to fight infection as well as it should. The COVID-19 vaccines being used in B.C. should still be safe for you.
- You may need to time your vaccine around your treatment or medication. When you are offered the vaccine, go to the COVID-19 BC Cancer webpage for more information. If you still have questions, please talk to your care provider at your next visit. This may be a nurse, family doctor, oncologist, hematologist, or radiation therapist.



When can I get the COVID-19 vaccine?

- B.C.'s COVID-19 Immunization Plan has started and may look different depending on where you live.
- Depending on your health condition, you may get the vaccine before your age group.
