Dear Jane Sample,

It's time for your cervix screening. **I encourage you to order a cervix self-screening kit that lets you collect your own vaginal sample to screen for cervical cancer.** The kit looks for the human papillomavirus (HPV), the virus that causes cervical cancer. Please ignore this letter if you've had cervix screening (i.e. Pap test or self-screening) in the last 3 months.

Screening saves lives by finding cancer early or stopping it from starting, even if you are feeling healthy and have no symptoms. It's important to do even when you have no family history of cancer.

The self-screening kit is:

- ✓ **Very easy to do:** it only takes 20 seconds to get a good sample from your vagina (not your cervix). The test is safe and shouldn't hurt. Evidence shows that you are just as good at getting a vaginal sample as a health professional.
- ✓ **Private:** can be done by yourself, wherever you feel most comfortable such as in your home or at a health care provider's office.
- ✓ **Simple:** can be done on your own time, without the need to travel or take time off work.

Why did I receive this letter?

Our records show that you are due for cervix screening. Anyone with a cervix, between the ages of 25 and 69, should screen regularly for cervical cancer. Screening can help find out if you are at risk for developing abnormal cells in your cervix. Finding and treating abnormal cells early can help prevent cancer. Screening can find cancer at an early stage – before it causes symptoms, when there are more treatment options.

Who should not get screened for cervical cancer?

You do not need to screen if you had cervical cancer or you do not have a cervix (such as total hysterectomy). If screening is no longer required, please contact us at 1-877-702-6566 or screening@bccancer.bc.ca to stop future reminder notices from being sent to you.

If you have bleeding after sex, between periods or after menopause; increased vaginal discharge; pelvic pain or pain during sex, it's important to discuss these symptoms with a health care provider. If you are pregnant, please talk to a health care provider about your options and when to screen.

Where did you get my personal health and contact information from?

As a program of the Provincial Health Services Authority, we receive relevant personal health and contact information from government organizations and health professionals that are directly involved in your care. We use this information to determine when you should receive letters for cancer screening and to provide you with your screening results. BC Cancer is committed to keeping your information private, confidential and secure at all times.

We use this information to:

- Invite you to consider screening when you are age-eligible;
- Remind you when you are due for your next screening test; and,
- Inform you of your screening test results, including follow-up information (if required).

You may be contacted in the future to complete feedback surveys regarding cervix screening. BC Cancer leads the provincial planning and regional delivery of cancer care for British Columbians. BC Cancer's mandate covers the full spectrum of cancer care and includes organized cancer screening programs for British Columbia.
